Our Research

Fellows collaborate with investigators and clinical supervisors from the fields of psychology, psychiatry, medicine, nursing, social work, epidemiology and health services.

Nicholas Allan, PhD

targets brief interventions addressing risk factors for **mood**, **anxiety**, **substance use** and **suicide-related outcomes**.



Tracy Stecker, PhD

aims to increase help-seeking behavior and mental health treatment engagement.



Peter Britton, PhD

studies **risk mitigation** among Veterans who are **hospitalized** or call the **Veterans Crisis Line**.



Craig Bryan, PsyD

develops and tests upstream suicide prevention strategies among Veterans to enhance screening, assessment and prevention.



Elizabeth Karras-Pilato, PhD

studies the use of **communication strategies** in public health approaches among at-risk Veterans.



Lisham Ashrafioun, PhD

conducts overlapping research on chronic pain management and substance use, particularly opioid misuse and mitigation.

Program Eligibility

Prospective PhD applicants must have completed a doctoral degree program in clinical or counseling psychology, as well as a doctoral internship in psychology.

Prospective MD or DO applicants must have completed a residency and be board certified or board eligible in their medical specialty.

VA ADVANCED FELLOWSHIP IN VETERAN MENTAL HEALTH AND SUICIDE PREVENTION









The VA Center of Excellence for Suicide Prevention and the affiliated University of Rochester Center for the Study and Prevention of Suicide (UR- CSPS) is pleased to announce the availability of a postdoctoral fellowship position for a psychologist or physician. The two-year program is supported by the VA Advanced Fellowship Program in Mental Illness Research and Treatment.

Program Goal: To prepare the next generation of leaders and innovators in suicide prevention research, education, and clinical care. We offer specialized training focused on suicide prevention strategies, with emphasis on at- risk populations including older Veterans; Veterans with depression, PTSD, or other mental health disorders; Veterans with substance use disorders and comorbid conditions; and Veterans facing health challenges such as chronic pain and sleep disorders. We also offer unique clinical and research opportunities in crisis response strategies and other brief interventions to address suicide risk. The fellowship is associated with (but not identical to) the UR-CSPS NIMH T32 Research Fellowship in Suicide Prevention.

Prospective fellows may apply to both fellowships.

Fellowship Activities: Participants spend approximately 75% time in research and 25% in related clinical activities, work closely with senior research and education mentors, participate in core didactic offerings of the VA Hub Site and UR-CSPS, obtain advanced clinical training in VA sites matched closely to research interests, prepare at least one paper for publication and one national presentation each year, and complete a suicide prevention education project.

Psychologist Applicants:

Application Date: Preferred deadline November 20, 2023

Start Date: Flexible July 1 – October 1, 2024

Salary and Benefits: Stipend starts at \$52,005 for Year 1. Fellows are eligible for health and life

insurance benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Requirements: Entry into the program requires U.S. citizenship and completion of a doctoral

degree, including dissertation defense, from an APA-, CPA- or PCSAS-accredited clinical or counseling program prior to the start date of the fellowship. Applications from those participating in new VHA psychology internship programs, in the process of applying for APA accreditation, may be acceptable provided that such programs were sanctioned by the VHA Central Office Program Director for Psychology and VHA Central Office of Academic Affiliations at the time of applicant's enrollment.

Physician Applicants:

Application Date: Preferred deadline November 20, 2023

Start Date: Flexible, but preferred July 1, 2023

Salary and Benefits: Stipend based on previous years of ACGME-accredited residency or fellowship

experience. Opportunities to supplement stipend are available. Fellows are eligible for health and life insurance benefits through the Department of Veterans Affairs. Hiring flexibility is available with potential options of part-time appointments.

Requirements: Entry into the program requires that all Physician Applicants complete an

Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) residency and be Board eligible in their specialty at the commencement of the Fellowship. All applicants must document current, unrestricted U.S. medical licensure and the completion of ACGME or American Osteopathic Association (AOA)-accredited specialty and subspecialty residency training. The Physician Component of the

Fellowship permits non-citizens of the U.S.
