Mixing buprenorphine and analgesia

If a patient taking buprenorphine requires opioids for analgesia, there are four options. Base the choice on the anticipated duration of pain, the treatment setting, and the response to the chosen option.

- 1. Continue buprenorphine maintenance therapy and titrate short-acting opioid analgesics (for pain of short duration only).
- 2. Divide buprenorphine dose every 6-8 hours.
- 3. Discontinue buprenorphine maintenance therapy and use opioid analgesics. Convert back to buprenorphine when acute pain abates.
- 4. If the patient is hospitalized, discontinue buprenorphine therapy, treat opioid dependence with methadone at 20-40 mg, and use short-acting opioid analgesics to treat pain. Have naloxone available at bedside. Discontinue methadone therapy and convert back to buprenorphine therapy before hospital discharge (for inpatients only).
