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Update on the MIRECC Research Fellows

Dr. Sushma Roberts, MIRECC Psychology Fellow, has accepted a full time staff psychologist position in the VA Maryland Health Care System. Dr. Roberts was highly productive during her fellowship and pursued interests surrounding posttraumatic stress disorder and psychological intervention including projects examining the efficacy of Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT) among OIF/OEF veterans with PTSD.



She has presented her work at numerous conferences such as International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies, Health Services Research and Development, and Association for Behavioral and Cognitive Therapies. She will be leaving Durham at the end of December to continue this work at the Trauma Recovery Program at the Baltimore VA Medical Center. In addition to her clinical and training responsibilities, Dr. Roberts plans to continue an active research career with a clinical faculty appointment at the University of Maryland Medical Center.

"We are all very excited for Sushma. While there is strong empirical support for exposure based therapies for the treatment of PTSD. many clinicians fail to implement them and often cite relatively high drop out rates associated with exposure treatment as a factor. Dr. Roberts' work with ACT incorporates the use of values, mindfulness, and behavior activation techniques and is very promising in this regard. I look forward to seeing the results of her work as she continues her career in Baltimore" notes Psychology Fellowship Director, Dr. Patrick Calhoun. "It is a real strength of the fellowship program, that we are retaining outstanding young psychologists like Dr. Roberts in the VA."

Scott D. McDonald, PhD, recently completed his doctoral training in clinical psychology at Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU). Prior to his graduate training, Scott developed an interest in neuroimaging

as a research assistant on studies of cocaine craving and "simulated deception" at the University Pennsylvania. At VCU Scott pursued an interest in anxiety disorders and examined coanitive and trait vulnerabilities to fears and phobias for his dissertation project. While in Richmond, Scott also enjoyed a clinical practicum at McGuire VAMC's Polytrauma/Brain Injury Program.



Prior to joining the MIRECC, Scott attended internship at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, completing several neuropsychology rotations as well as a rewarding clinical rotation in the Birmingham VAMC's PTSD clinic. Scott's current research interests broadly involve the relationship between psychopathology and cognitive functioning with a particular focus on PTSD and other anxiety disorders. In the clinic Scott is looking forward to providing time-limited, empirically-supported treatment for OIF/OEF veterans with PTSD and associated symptoms.

Jasmeet Pannu Hayes, PhD, received her PhD in Clinical Psychology at the University of Arizona. Prior to joining the MIRECC, she completed a clinical internship

with an emphasis in neuropsychology at the Boston VAMC/Harvard Medical School. Jasmeet's current research focus is examining the neural correlates of memory and attention processes in patients with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) utilizing functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI)



methodology. This line of research has implications for understanding the effect of emotion and anxiety on memory, as well as the putative cognitive and neural mechanisms involved in behavioral treatments for PTSD. In line with her interest in brain and behavior relationships, her clinical program focuses on neuropsychological assessment of various neurological and psychiatric populations.

Overview:

Dr. Calnaido finished a residency in Psychiatry in the Duke University Health System. His research interest lies in the comorbidity of mental illness and chronic pain

Dr. Calnaido's present research focuses on the correlation of pain and cognitive and emotional states. He currently has projects in neuroimaging core examining differences in the brain activation of chronic low back pain patients related to coping skills training. In addition. hе the examining psychometric results of the MIRECC registry database correlating them to pain ratings.

be followed by a mail out survey of OIF/OEF veterans living in VISN 6 with hopes of replicating the mail-out survey at the national level in partnership with other VA offices if approved. Six post-deployment focus groups with 11-15 participants each were conducted: 2 groups of Active Duty, separated OIF/OEF veterans; 2 groups of National Guard OIF/OEF veterans; 1 group of spouses only, and; 1 group of female OIF/OEF veterans only. Sampling strategy included random selection of invitees among all eligible OIF/OEF veterans residing within a 2-hour drive of the MIRECC seat in Durham, NC.

Many of the veterans seen had not yet received VA services. Information solicited from the groups included: health/mental health concerns during and post deployment, kinds of services utilized and satisfaction with services, and barriers and preferences for services and information related to post deployment health. SRBI has now completed the Focus Group Report and forwarded the results so that this MIRECC team, together with our contractor, can begin the mailed survey stage of our plan. Project results will guide the development and implementation of clinical services, policies and research for OIF/OEF veterans in VISN 6 and will have national relevance for our VHA and DoD collaborators.
